**Progress, Not** Perfection

If you ever thought about addressing the

world's greatest problems, you've probably encountered someone called "Overwhelmed." Overwhelmed can bring up all the reasons you don't need to try to do something about these problems. When donating food to a local food pantry, Overwhelmed will say, "Do you really think you're going to end world hunger with a bag of groceries?" He's relentless. He goes around and around in your head, until you throw your hands into the air and say, "What's the use!"



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Overwhelmed is crafty. At times, he'll use humor, just so you don't get disgusted with him. He's the voice who came up with the saying, "If the children in China go hungry because I'm not eating all my supper, I'll be glad to let them have this supper." What kid hasn't tried that one at the dinner table!

There are perpetual menaces in the world that never seem to go away: world hunger, the wars of powerful nations against weaker ones, economic disparities between the rich and the poor, political corruption, and racism, to name just a few. These seemingly intractable problems can make our efforts at peace, equity and justice seem futile. Has there ever been a generation that didn't face these demons? Even Jesus said, "The poor you will always have with you" (Mt 26:11). It takes imagination, energy and wisdom to confront these enduring problems. These powerful friends are given by the Holy Spirit to summon the will to engage the enemy. Overwhelmed is our enemy. The will to engage is our friend.

Climate change is a historically recent addition to these intractable problems that have been developing over the last couple of hundred years, since the dawn of the industrial revolution when we began to

pumping gas emissions into the atmosphere and cutting down more trees than we were planting. Mr. Overwhelmed has lots of tricks in his bag to shut us up and shut down our efforts.

"Climate change is part of the natural flow of planetary life; there's nothing you can do about it."

"There's not enough minerals in the earth to produce the electric cares we need."

"Do you really think building a compost pile in your backyard is going to save the planet?"

"This is just another way for the government to control our lives."

"You're a hypocrite. You say you care about the climate while you fly to a climate conference half way around the world."

Overwhelmed has lots of things to make us throw up our hands and simply flow down the stream of materialistic consumption. Overwhelmed wants us to think of ourselves as consumers rather than citizens. In fact, Overwhelmed is the leading

lobbyist for the fossil fuel industry and the large corporations making billions of dollars cutting down the Amazon rain forests. They want regular individuals to become consumed with individual responsibility as a form of distraction. If

we can just shame each other for

eating meat, driving a car, or using air conditioning, then we will not notice what we are doing to the planet.



We need to send Overwhelmed into the desert where he won't bother us and undermine our collective efforts to love God's creation and our neighbors around the world. It's progress, not perfection. We can take collective social action even while we reduce our personal carbon footprint. We must hold politicians and the fossil fuel industry accountable for the degradation of the environment under their watch. It's a both/and scenario. We've got to be able to walk and chew gum at the same time. Social/corporate responsibility and personal responsibility. There is an urgency in the matter and the window for action is closing down upon us. Our task is to make progress as individuals, churches, corporations and nations so we can love God's creation in a more perfect way. Not perfect, just progress.

Why do members of the C3 board see the need of our work?

A group of African Christians was blessed with mango trees and they were often excited that God blessed them with abundance of nature. Africa, they claimed, was oversupplied with nature, and this was evident in the abundance of mangoes that surrounded them. Some women would celebrate this abundance by plucking mangoes from the trees and taking the surplus to the local markets for sale, making money out of it to support their families.
