The miracle of Jesus feeding the 5,000 is the only miracle Jesus performed, notwithstanding the

resurrection, recorded in all four gospels. It must have been pretty important for Matthew, Mark, Luke and John all to record some version of it. What would have made this miracle so memorable compared to the virgin birth (Luke) or the healing of the demoniac (not in John), or the raising of Lazarus (John)? Perhaps simplicity is the key. An

unknown boy offers his five loaves of bread and two fish to Jesus to be used for others. It's mysterious as well, shrouded in a power we can't explain, as Jesus takes this simple gift and converts it into a massive amount of food. The Christian community is energized by the child-like generosity and supernatural power on display in the story. It brings the basic elements of common food and spiritual faith together in miraculous, unforgettable fashion.

There are as many lessons is this story as there were left over pieces of food at the end of it. The first lesson is the fundamental recognition that the miracle begins with a gift. The boy brings his gift to the disciples of Jesus as they are trying to figure out how to feed this hungry crowd.

They were swamped in a quagmire of logistical and economic questions. Where would they get the money to buy enough food? How

would they transport it? Who would have such a huge quantity of food on hand at this time of day. (Walmart is still thousands of years away!) The boy doesn't have those answers. All he has is five loaves of barley bread, poor man's bread, and 2 fish. He offers it as a gift, recognizing it was already a gift to him. I doubt seriously he baked that bread. His mother probably did it for him. And it's unlikely he caught the fish. His

father or brothers probably did that. And where did his father and mother get the bread and fish? The bread came from the earth which God created. The fish came from a river or the sea, which God populated with swimming creatures.

The miracle in this food and faith story is more than Jesus converting this boy's gift into a feast for 5,000. The miracle started well before the boy showed up with his food, as barley grew in the ground and fish swam in the sea. The barley seed mixed with soil, rain, the sun, and later heat and yeast to be useful for the multitude. The fish ate algae and other small fish and plants to grow and become nutrition for humans. It is a miracle of the interconnectedness

of the world that is hidden, like the yeast making the bread rise during the night. Faith is the necessary ingredient to recognize this is from God and worthy of thanksgiving.

Someone once said, "If Christ is God's greatest gift, then surely creation is God's second greatest gift." Here is how Katharine Hayhoe, evangelical Christian and renowned scientist in Texas, puts it: "On Easter, we celebrate God's greatest gift, his Son, who came to give us spiritual life, and all that life entails. On Earth Day, we celebrate God's second-greatest gift to us: this planet, which gives

us our physical life."

The Ecumenical Patriarch of the Orthodox Church, Bartholomew I, said similarly, "The world we enjoy comprises a gift we have received ... it is a gift from God the Creator, a healing gift, a gift of wonder and beauty."

Pope Francis, in his encyclical Laudato Si, wrote, "Nature is usually seen as a system which can be studied, understood and controlled, whereas creation can only be understood as a gift from the outstretched hand of the Father of all."

The miracle of the feeding of the 5,000 may well be the second most important miracle recorded in Scripture, behind the resurrection. The resurrection teaches us the life overcomes death in the Kingdom of God. The feeding of the 5,000 teaches us that food comes from creation which gives us life in the Kingdom of God. Food without faith is just junk food. Faith without food is Gnosticism. Food received in thanksgiving as a gift from God sustains the abundant life Jesus promised. It's a miracle we can see repeated every day when we break bread and eat together in community.
